Colton History Society assembled a collection of documents, images and everyday items reflecting village life in the late 20th Century and before. They have been deposited with the wish that villagers recover them 100 years hence in 2110.

If you are reading this letter we can only assume that you have some interest in the history of Colton and you are accessing the Colton Parochial Records.

We have placed these documents on file with the Staffordshire Records Office with the expectation that they will be helpful to the parishioners of Colton near Rugeley in recovering the Time Capsule deposited at St Mary's Church by the Colton History Society.


It is our wish that the Capsule be recovered in 2110.

On the 12th. November 2009 a time capsule was buried in the churchyard of St Mary's Parish church in Colton. We are hoping that it will remain buried for 100 years from that date. The Time Capsule was organised and assembled by Colton History Society. The capsule is in the form of a lead box that has been welded to seal it tight in the hope that the contents will remain in good condition. It contains a variety of artefacts and information that we have collected together reflecting the age we live in and life in Colton. A list of its contents is deposited with this letter.

Although it was organised by the History Society it very much represents the community of Colton in 2009. Many people have contributed to its contents in one way or another. All the different organisations that flourish in the village have contributed information about themselves to give the reader of 100 years time some flavour of the activities which take place. The children of St. Mary's school have also contributed to the contents and will hopefully give the reader of the future some insight into what it was like to be a schoolchild in 2009.

On the day it was buried it was a pleasant, mild, Autumn morning. There were lots of people present to watch the capsule being placed in its burial spot including all of the children from the school. The Chairman of the Parish Council Mr. Tony Hill, gave a short speech and then deposited the first shovel of earth on top of the capsule. All the schoolchildren then also placed a shovel full of soil over the capsule. The occasion was a very happy one with a real sense of community spirit.

Our hope is that it remains buried for 100 years and that it will give those who open it the same amount of pleasure it has given the residents of Colton on assembling and burying it.

As we bury this time capsule Colton History Society has been in existence for seven years. The History Society comprises of some forty members meeting once a month in the village hall where we have invited guest speakers and in the summer months we embark on a number of field visits.

The Society has been able to draw on many records and documents deposited in the Staffordshire Record Offices to help build up an understanding of the history of the village that we can trace back to Anglo Saxon times.

In particular it was the work of Frederic Bonney and the Rev Parker in the late Victorian era that inspired the society to create this 'Time Capsule' so that we, the villagers in the early 21st century could in turn leave our legacy to the villagers of the early 22^{nd} century.

As we approach the end of the first decade of the 21st century we look forward with a degree of apprehension. Climate change, Co² emissions, environmental pollution and the uncertain future of energy supplies all combine in predications of a much changed world in 2110.

The social changes taking place now will also manifest in a U.K. with a social and religious structure much changed from the last century. We think at this time we all share a degree of concern over the legacy we are leaving our grandchildren.

On a more positive note, when we look back over the second half of the 20^{th} century the rate of change has been incredible. Since the end of World War II we have enjoyed a technological revolution greater than the industrial revolution in the 1800's. Technology and communications driven by computerisation has developed at an exponential rate since the 1960's. The world has become a much smaller place as a result.

This explosion in technology presents us with a real problem when we try to determine in what form we should leave information for you. Twenty five years ago personal computers and mobile telephones were things of fantasy. Now just about every adult and child has or has access to both.

With these advancements it is difficult for us to envisage technological developments in the coming twenty let alone one hundred years. This gives us a problem in deciding how we leave material for you in the future. One thing is for sure; our computer is going to look very, very strange to your eyes! We have concluded that paper copies are the best media. However the bulk of paper limits how much we can leave. So we have compromised by leaving our more important documents as paper copies and also a notebook computer which is loaded with copies of all of our images and documents. Our hope is that the hardware and software remain intact in the capsule and that you will be able to access them. Only you will know if our hope translates into a reality.

As a society we have published a significant amount of material, with our book Colton – the History of a Staffordshire Village being the high point. Enclosed in this capsule is a copy of that book together with a copy of the Rev Parker's book Colton and the De Wastneys from a hundred years earlier, together with copies of our other printed material that the Society has produced to date.

We have also included a survey of Colton in the Medieval period that the Society commissioned Dr. Hunt of Birmingham University to undertake. He collected the documentary evidence to show that in the Medieval period Colton was a bustling, thriving borough with resident tradesmen and a market. Over the centuries we have lost all of these, in fact we no longer have a shop. However the strong community spirit of the residents still lives on.

Our hope is that you will find all the contents of great interest and that they will give you some insight into the lives and activities of the residents of Colton in 2010.


